Yet more and more they did desire,
to serue their lusts and vvils.
30 But as the meat vvvas in their mouths,
his vvwrath vpon them fell:
31 And slew the flower of all their youth
and choise of Israel.
32 Yet fell they to their vvvented sinne,
and still they did him grieue:
For all the vvonders that he vvrought,
they vvould not him belieue.
33 Their dayes therefore he shortened,
and made their honour vaine:
Their yecres did vvast and passe away,
vvvith terror and vvvith paine.
34 But euer vvhen he plagued them
they sought him by and by:
Remembering that he vvvas their strength,
their help and God most hie.
35 Though in their mouthes they did but
and flatter vvith the Lord: (glose
And vvith their tongues & in their hars
dissembled euery vvord.


36 For vvwhy: their hearts vvwere nothing
to him, nor to his trade: (bans
Nor yet to keepe or to performe
the couenant that vvvas made.
37 Yet vvvas hee still so mercifull,
vvwhen they deserued to dye:
That he forgau them their misdeeds,
and vvould not them destroy.
38 Yea many a time he turnde his vvwrath
and did him selfe aduise:
And vvould not suffer all his vvvhole
displeasure to arise.
39 Considering that they vvwere but flesh,
and euen as a vvvinde
That passeth away, and cannot vvwell
returne by his ovvne kinde.
40 How often times in vvwildernesse
did they the Lord prouoke:
How did they stir and moue the Lord

to plague them vvwith his stroke:
41 Yet did they turne againe to sinne,
and tempred God etlsoone,
Pretending to the holy Lord
vvwhat things they vvould haue done.
42 Not thinking of his hand and powver,
nor of the day vvwhen he
Delivered them out of the hands
of the fierce enimie.
43 Nor how he vvrought his miracles
as they themselues beheld
In Egypt, and the vvonders that
he did in Zoan field.
44 Nor how he turned by his powver
their vvwaters into bloud:
That no man might receiue his drinke
at riuier or at Roud,
45 Nor how he sent them swarms of
vvwhich did them sore annoy: (Flies
And fld their country full of Frogs
vvwhich did their Land destroy.


46 Nor how he did commit their fruits
vvnto the Caterpillar:
And all the labour of their hands
he gau to the Grashopper.
47 VVith hailstones he destroyed their
seed that they vvwere all lost: (vines
And nor so much as vvilde Fig-trees
but he consumed vvwith frost.
48 And yet vvwith hailstones once againe
the Lord their cattrell smote:
And all their socks & heards likewise
vvwith thunderbolts full hot.
49 He cast vpon them in his ire
and in his fury strong
Displeasure, vvwrath and euill spirits
to trouble them among.
50 Then to his vvwrath he made a vvway,
and spared not the least:
But gau vnto the pestilence
the man and eke the beast.


Psalme 78.

51 He strake also the first borne all
that vp in Egypt came:
And all the chiefe of men and beasts
vvwithin the tents of Ham.
52 But as for all his ovvne deare folke
he did preferue and keepe,
And carried them through vvwildernesse
euen like a flock of sheepe.
53 VVithout all feare both safe & sound
he brought them out of thrall:
VVhereas their foes vvwith rage of sea
vvwere ouervvwhelmed all.
54 And brought them out into the coasts
of his ovvne holy land:
Euen to the mount vvwhich he had got
by his strong arme and hand.
55 And there cast out the heathen folke,
and did their land diuide:
And in their tents he set the tribes
of Israel to abide.
56 Yet for all this their God most hie
they sturd and tempred still:
And vvould not keepe his testament,
nor yet obey his will.
57 But as their fathers turned backe,
euen so they vvwent astray:
Much like a bow that vvould not bend,
but slip and start away.

58 And grieved him vvwith their hill altars
vvwith offerings and vvwith fire:
And vvwith their Idols vvvehemently
prouoked him to ire.
59 There vvwith his vvwrath began againe
to kinde in his breast:
The naughtynesse of Israel
he did so much detest.
60 Then he forsooke the Tabernacle
of Silo, vvwhere he vvvas
Right conseruant vvwith earthly men
euen as his dvvelling place.
61 Then suffered he his might & powver
in bondage for to stand:


And gau the honor of his Arke
into his enemies hand.
62 And did commit them to the sword,
vvwrath vvwith his heritage:
63 The yong men vvwere deuourde vvwith
Maides had no marriage. (fire
64 And vvwith the sword the priests also
did perish euery one:
And nor a vvviddovv left allus
their death fer to bemone.
65 And then the Lord began to vvwake
like one that slept a time:
And as a valiant man of vvwar
refreshed after vvvine.
66 VVith Emrods in their hinder parts
he strake his enemies all:
And put them then vnto a shame
that vvvas perpetuall.
67 Then he the tent and tabernacle
of Ioseph did refuse:
As for the tribe of Ephraim
he vvwould in no vvwise chuse.
68 But chose the tribe of Iehuda,
vvwhereas he meant to dwell:
Euen the noble Mount Sion,
vvwhich he did loue so vvwell.
69 VVhereas he did his Temple build
both sumptuously and sure:
Like as the earth vvwhich he hath made
for euer to endure.
70 Then chose he Dauid him to serue
his people for to keepe:
VVhich he tooke vp and brought away,
euen from the folds of sheepe.
71 As he did follow the Eues vvwith
the Lord did him aduance: yong,
To feed his people Israel
and his inheritance.
72 Thus Dauid vvwith a faithfull heart,
his flock and charge did feed:
And prudently vvwith all his powver
did gouerne them indeed:
