the Copper fine and in a right Condition, which will cause it never to be right clear in the Barrel; an Item sufficient to show the mistake of all those that think to extel in Malt Liquors, by boiling them two or three Hours, to the great Consusion of the Wort, and doing more harm than

good to the Drink.

But to be more particular in those two Extreams, it is my Opinion, as I have faid before, that no Ale Worts boiled less than an Hour can be good, because in an Hour's time they cannot acquire a thickness of Body any ways detrimental to them, and in less than an Hour the ramous viscid parts of the Ale cannot be sufficiently broke and divided, so as to prevent it running into Cohesions, Ropyness and Sower-. ness, because in Ales there are not Hops enough allowed to do this, which good boiling must in a great measure supply, or else such Drink I am sure can never be agreeable to the Body of Man; for then its cohesive Parts being not thoroughly broke and comminuted by time and boiling, remains in a hard texture of Parts, which confequently obliges the Stomach to work more than ordinary to digest and fecrete such parboil'd Liquor, that time and fire should have cured before: Is not this apparent in half boil'd Meats, or un-
