

3 In honour of his holy name,
reioyce with one accord:
And let the hearts also reioyce
of them that seeke the Lord.
4 Seeke ye the Lord & seek the strength
of his eternall might:
And seeke his face continually
and presence of his sight.

5 The wondrous workes that he hath
keepe still in mindefull heart: ^{done}
Ne let the iudgements of his mouth
out of your minde depart.
6 Ye that of faithfull Abraham,
his seruants, are the seed:
7 his elect, the children that
of Iacob doe proceed.

7 For he, he onely is I say,
the mightie Lord our God:
And his most right: all iudgements are
through all the earth abroad.
8 His promise and his covenant,
vvhich he hath made to his:
He hath remembred euermore,
to thousands of degrees.

The second part.

9 The covenant vvhich he hath made
with Abraham long agoe:
And faithfull oath vvhich he hath sworn
to Isaac also.
10 And did confirme the same for Iayv,
that Iacob should obey:
And for eternall covenant
to Israel for aye.

11 VVhen he thus said, loe I to you
all Canaan land vvvill giue:
The lot of your inheritance,
vvherein your seed shall liue.
12 Although their number at that time
did very small appeare:

yea, very small, and in the land
they then but strangers were.

13 VVhile yet they vvalkt from land to
vwithout a sure aboad: ^{(land,}
And vvhile from sundry kingdomes they
did vander all abroad.
14 And vvrong at no oppressors hand
he suffered them to take:
But euen the great and mighty Kings
reproved for their sake.

15 And thus he said, touch ye not those
that mine annointed be:
Ne doe the Prophets any harme
that doe pertaine to me.
16 He calde a death vpon the land,
of bread he stroyde the store,
But he against their time of need,
had sent a man before.

The third part.

17 Euen Joseph vvhich had once borne
to liue a slave in vvoe: ^{(sould,}
18 VVhose feet they hurt in stocks, vvhose
the iron peare't also. ^{(soule}
19 VVtill the time came vvhens his cause
was knowne apparantly:
The mightv vvoid of God the Lord
his faultlesse truth did trye.

20 The king sent and deliuered him
from prison vvhre he was:
The ruler of the people then
did freely let him passe.
21 And ouer all his route he made
him Lord, to beare the svvay:
And of his substance made him haue
the rule and all the stay.

22 That he might to his vvvill instruct
the Princes of the land:
And vvvisedomes lore his auncient men
might teach to vnderstand.
23 Then into the Egiptian land
came Israel also:

And Iacob in the land of Ham,
did liue a stranger tho.

24 His people he exceedingly
in number made to flovy:
And ouer all their enemies
in strength he made them growv.
25 VVhose heart returned that they vvvith
his people did entreat: ^{(hate}
And did his seruants vvrongfully
abuse, vvvith false deceit.

The fourth part.

26 His faithfull seruant Moses then,
and Aaron vvhom he chose:
He did command to goe to them,
his message to disclose.
27 The wondrous message of his signes
amongst them they did shevy:
And vvvonders in the land of Ham
then did they vvorke also.

28 Darknesse he sent, and made it dark,
in stead of brighter day:
29 And vnto his commission
they did not disobey.
30 He turnde their vvaters into bloud,
he did their fishes slay:
Their land brought frogs, euen in the
vvhether their king Pharaoh lay. ^{(place}

31 He spake, & at his voyce there came
great swarms of noysome flies:
And all the quarters of their land
were filld vvvith crawling lice.
32 He gaue them cold and stony haile
in stead of milder raine:
And fiery flames vvvithin their land
he sent vnto their paine.

33 He smote the vines and all the trees
vvhre on their figs did growv:
And all the trees vvvithin their coasts
dovvne did he ouerthrowv.
34 He spake, then Caterpillers did
and Grashoppers abound:
35 VVhich eat the grasse in all their land

and fruit of all their ground.
The fifth part.

36 The first begotten in the land
eke daily did he smite:
Yea, the beginning and first fruit
of all their strength and might.
37 VVith gold & silver hee them brought
from Egypt land to passe:
And in the number of the Tribes
no feeble one there was.

38 Egypt was glad and ioyfull then,
vvhens they did thence depart:
For terror and the feare of them
was fallen vpon their heart.
39 To shroude them from the parching
a cloud he did display: ^{(heate}
And fire he sent to gaue them light,
vvhens night had hid the day.

40 Egypt asked and he caused Quails
to raine at their request:
And fully vvvith the bread of Sauea
their hunger hee represt.
41 He opened then the stony rocks,
and vvvater gushed out:
And in the dry and parched grounds
like riuers ran about.

42 For of his holy covenant
aye mindefull was he tho:
VVhich to his seruants Abraham
he plighted long agoe.
43 He brought his people forth vvvith
and his elect vvvith ioy: ^{(mirth}
Out of the cruell land vvhre they
had liud in great annoy.

44 And of the heathen men he gaue
to them the fruitfull land:
The labors of the people eke
they tooke into their hand.
45 That they his holy statutes might
obserue for euermore:
And faithfullly obey his lawes,
praise ye the Lord therefore.
